PROGRAM NOTES

Expansion for open ensemble

Expansion explores the widening of space and the progression of entropy in the physical world as depicted through performance. Beginning from a singular element, events unfold over time as dictated by a set of rules predetermined by the universe. With musical pitches, articulation, and rest, this unfolding is brought to life for us to reflect upon.

Constellation for toy piano

Constellation is a short and rhythmic work for toy piano inspired by images of constellations in the night sky. As a toy piano is thought to be a child's instrument, this imaginative state is curious, fond, and innocent, only pushed to chaos by excitement and wonder.

Tenparu (テンパる) for soprano saxophone

Tenparu $(\bar{\tau} > \tilde{\beta})$ is a Japanese expression that conveys being at the edge of one's limits. This work uses various gestures that come in and out of focus to capture the sense of one slowly approaching their breaking point. Ultimately, that threshold is crossed in a final squeal of emotion.

Liminal for three violins and percussion

Life consists of spaces which we move between at certain points. The transitional space between these phases of life are known as liminal spaces. Thus, *Liminal* is a musical exploration and introspective consideration of these spaces. Whether these spaces are dissonant and agitated, such as with the opening sonorities, or calm and spaced, as with the harmonic stasis halfway through the work, or both, is specific to the individual. Where are you?

Other Worlds for open ensemble

Other Worlds suggests that our world is just one of many. The colors and phenomena of other worlds would be different from ours. Every ensemble to play this work will choose the world they bring to life and present it as its own. What is this world; how would you describe it?

Trails for open ensemble

Trails seeks to provide an exploration of the natural world through performance. How do we move through time and space, and how do we represent that with our musical instruments and stage-based movements? This work does not seek to give direct answers, but instead to give performers and audience alike the space to consider these ideas deeply.

Window for Eb clarinet

Painting a modal, melancholic soundscape, *Window* imagines the colors of the outside world, viewed from inside through a large window. The world outside is rainy and dreary, but still filled with life and love. The various colors and rhythms used throughout aim to alternate between calm and instability, based on a longing for sunshine and company when there is no choice but to dream alone.

By The Old Grove for double reed ensemble

There are places dear to all of us in life. Places with memories and emotions of different qualities... places that give a notion of identity to all of us. When writing this work, the image of a small wooded area came to mind. Let us dance in our memories by the old grove, recalling memories of varying colors and tempos that push us toward who we are today.

ABOUT THE COMPOSER

Connor Gibbs (b. 1995) is a composer, music educator, and singer from Western Massachusetts. He is currently studying at Bowling Green State University for his MM degree in Composition with Dr. Christopher Dietz and Dr. Mikel Kuehn. Connor previously graduated from Wagner College in May 2017 with his Bachelor of Arts in Music and taught choral and vocal music in Springfield, Massachusetts for three years.

Connor's music has been described as modal and motivic, shifting through different colors to achieve surprising and occasionally programmatic effects. His current creative inspirations include outer space and the greater universe and the inner workings of the human psyche.

His work has been performed across the United States and Europe at festivals and workshops including the Space City New Music Festival, Dartington International Music Festival, European University Cyprus International Composition Workshop, Boise New Music Series, highSCORE Festival, Iceberg New Music Institute, and more. Collaborations with other artists include violinist Esther Abrami, flutist Iwona Glinka, and playwright Daniel Smith.

As a performer, Katrina plays with the BG Philharmonia and has also played with the Perrysburg Symphony, Central Ohio Symphony, Westerville Symphony, and the Lancaster Festival Community Orchestra. After graduating, she hopes to get her Master's degree in violin performance and later a job teaching middle or high school orchestra as well as continuing her private studio and performing in a local orchestra.
- A native of Manchester, Michigan, Cozette Cecconie is a well-rounded musician who enjoys bassoon performance under a wide range of musical influences. She combines her enthusiasm and expression to perform music in an eloquent and exciting way. As a Senior Undergraduate in Bassoon Performance at Bowling Green State University of Ohio, Cozette continues to pursue new heights of expertise as she nears the end of her undergraduate studies under Dr. Susan Nelson. Having started her piano studies at age 6, she is also a piano accompanist, who collaborates with other specialists (dance, art, drama and music) for musicals, recitals and other theater events. Cozette plans to continue her performance studies after graduation, pursuing a Master's Degree.
- Sarah Curtiss is an active performer both regionally and nationally. In 2018, she won the Bismarck-Mandan and Greater Grand Forks Symphony Orchestra Young Artist Competitions and interned at National Flute Association Convention in Orlando, Florida. In 2019, she was one of the winners of the NFA Collegiate Flute Choir Competition and performed on flute and piccolo at the convention in Salt Lake City, Utah. His dissertation on Gabriel Erkoreka's works for solo piano is the first scholarly discussion of his piano music. Ariel also holds degrees from Central Michigan University (M.M.), where he studied with Alexandra Mascolo-David, and State University of Campinas (B.M.), studying with Maria José Carrasqueira and Alexandre Zamith.

Some of his recent activities include participation at the Annual Bowling Green New Music Festival 38, 39, 40, and 41, the 2017 IDRS Annual Conference (Appleton, WI), Society of Composers 2018 National Conference (Tacoma, WA), and the 14th and 15th seasons of soundSCAPE Festival (Cesena, Italy).

Throughout his studies, Ariel has played with conductors Michael Lewansky, Matilda Hofman, Kenneth Thompson, Emily Freeman Brown, Alex Popovici, Nina Nash-Robertson, Alan Gumm, Hans-Peter Schurz and Fernando Barreto. He has also played in Masterclasses with pianists such as Ursula Oppens, Cristina Ortiz, Cristina Gerling, Fabio Luz, Luca Chiantore, Richard Steinbach, Sergio Gallo, Jeffrey Jacob and Ann Schein, among others.

- Allison Dana is starting her M.M. in Oboe Performance at BGSU, and currently holds Bachelor's degrees in Music Education and Oboe Performance from The State University of New York at Fredonia. Allison was awarded the Performer's Certificate for her work in Undergraduate performance and won the Fredonia Concerto Competition in 2020. She has performed on oboe and English horn for orchestras and theater companies throughout New York, including the Fredonia College Symphony, the Metropolitan Youth Orchestra, and the Hillman Opera. At Bowling Green, Brandon is also the band librarian and is a part of the Music Ambassador Program where he helps with enrollment events as well as College of Musical Arts outreach programs.

- Jane Kelly, originally from Albuquerque, New Mexico, received her bachelor's degree in trumpet performance from New Mexico State University in 2020, where she studied with Dr. Pancho Romero and was involved in the wind symphony, philharmonic orchestra, jazz ensembles, and marching band.
