#### **PROGRAM NOTES**

"Credo" is Latin for "I believe" and is used primarily in religious contexts. But even if not strictly spiritual, a belief can be a valuable source of guidance or coherence in one's life experience. One's assertion of their belief can certainly be not just a statement but an embodied enactment of that belief.

Credo, by Edwin Arlington Robinson

I cannot find my way: there is no star
In all the shrouded heavens anywhere;
And there is not a whisper in the air
Of any living voice but one so far
That I can hear it only as a bar
Of lost, imperial music, played when fair
And angel fingers wove, and unaware,
Dead leaves to garlands where no roses are.

No, there is not a glimmer, nor a call, For one that welcomes, welcomes when he fears, The black and awful chaos of the night; For through it all--above, beyond it all--I know the far sent message of the years, I feel the coming glory of the light.

Impalpable play of foretime gleams on the canvas is inspired by Joan Miro's paintings and his use of different shades of blue. Ibishov intentionally put the writing of the work to the eve of sunrise so he could observe how the darkness of the night turned blue with the first red rays of the sun, and how the past is transformed into present in the form of natural light.

**Micro Sonic Sketches** is an on-going collection of miniatures for soloists, each featuring specific and creative techniques of the instrument. These sketches use untraditional approaches to notation that allows for the freedom and flexibility of interpretation of the performer. Each sketch explores a particular topic relevant to our current circumstance of being. The 2<sup>nd</sup> work in this collection, *Mental Activities*, is for solo voice and explores a wide range in timbre.

**Reminiscence** is written in 7 short movements that are performed in a seamless flow from one movement to the next. This work is mostly gestural and uses a wide range of extended techniques throughout. The piano keys themselves gradually enter and recede from the sound world, reaching a dramatic, turbulent height in the central, fourth movement.

**Sonatine** is an 8-minute recital work in one movement inspired by Coleman's ravels throughout Europe, most notably while touring with jazz icon Steve Coleman. The work is reminiscent of a performance at a nightclub, where players wailed soulful tunes and riffs on a lovely summer evening in Berlin. *Sonatine* starts on fire, and thrives with intensity, rhythmic drive, and drama for both clarinetist and pianist.

Childhood Carbohydrates: This saxophone quartet consists of three miniatures, each inspired by a food that was common in my childhood. The shape and spelling of each food has a direct impact on the form and melodic material of each movement. The resulting nature of this piece is whimsical and light-hearted, much like a child's spirit.

**Toying Around** is a short piece inspired by the creative imagination of childhood. With frenzying rhythms, moments of reflection, and wide leaps of color, the joys lost to adulthood are reimagined here. At the end of a long adventure, and this piece, we rest and return to the bustle of the everyday. But for a moment, get lost in what brings you happiness.

Sonata a um Homem Sem Talento (Sonata to a Man Without Talent) is inspired by the work  $Mun\bar{o}$  no Hito (無能の人, The Man Without Talent), a semi-autobiographical graphic novel by Japanese cartoonist Yoshiharu Tsuge (b. 1937).

Swearing off cartooning as a profession, Tsuge takes on a series of unconventional jobs — used camera salesman, ferryman, and stone collector — hoping to find success among the hucksters, speculators, and deadbeats he does business with. Instead, he fails again and again, unable to provide for his family, earning only their contempt and his own.

**Sonata No. 2 for Flute and Piano** was premiered in 2016 at the National Flute Association Convention by Marisa Canales. The second movement of the sonata, *Presto con spirito*, features rhythmic drive, soaring melodies, and exchange between flute and piano and is filled with excitement and passion from start to finish.

#### **COMPOSER BIOGRAPHIES**

Valerie Coleman is regarded by many as an iconic artist who continues to pave her own unique path as a composer, GRAMMY®-nominated flutist, and entrepreneur. Highlighted as one of the "Top 35 Women Composers" by *The Washington Post*, she was named Performance Today's 2020 *Classical Woman of the Year*, an honor bestowed to an individual who has made a significant contribution to classical music as a performer, composer, or educator. Her works have garnered awards such as the MAPFund, ASCAP Honors Award, Chamber Music America's Classical Commissioning Program, Herb Alpert Ragdale Residency Award, and nominations from The American Academy of Arts and Letters and United States Artists. Connor Gibbs (he/him) is a composer, music educator, and singer from Western Massachusetts. He is currently studying at Bowling Green State University for his MM degree in Composition with Drs. Marilyn Shrude, Christopher Dietz, and Mikel Kuehn. Connor previously graduated from Wagner College in May 2017 with his Bachelor of Arts in Music and taught choral and vocal music in Springfield, Massachusetts for three years.

His work has been performed across the United States and Europe at festivals and workshops including the Space City New Music Festival, Dartington International Music Festival, European University Cyprus International Composition Workshop, Boise New Music Series, highSCORE Festival, Iceberg New Music Institute, and more. Collaborations with other artists include violinist Esther Abrami, flutist Iwona Glinka, and playwright Daniel Smith.

**Tahir Ibishov** was born in Makiivka, Ukraine in 1986. Since 1989 he has been living in Azerbaijan and is a citizen of the Republic of Azerbaijan. He received his undergraduate degree in composition in the studios of Khayyam Mirzezade and Nazim Mirishli at Baku Music Academy.

He also received his master's degree in composition in the studio of Beat Furrer at the Graz University of Music and Fine Arts. (*Not pictured*)

He is a recipient of several awards, such as the Honorary Diploma in Ghazal-Music-Competition for 880th Anniversary of Nizami Ganjavi, the Vienna Film Music Award for his collaborative work "Egon Schiele - Tod und Mädchen" with Flora Geißelbrecht, the Certificate of Achievement & Publishing in the USA award at the Hajibeyli International Composition Competition. His music has been performed at the "TonLagen 2012" - the international contemporary music festival HELLERAU- European Center of Arts Dresden, and at the Memomoriam Nasimi - 650 Years Imadeddin Nasimi Music Festival in Berlin.

**Sofia Jen Ouyang** is a composer interested in the fusion of musical, literary, and philosophical concepts. Currently pursuing her bachelor degrees in Music and Philosophy at Columbia University, Sofia studies composition with Andrew Norman at The Juilliard School. She has worked with JACK Quartet, National Sawdust Ensemble, Jeffrey Zeigler, Juliette Kang, and Cornelia Herrmann among others and has received numerous honors, including from the BMI Student Composer Award (2021) and Luna Lab (2020). Connor Scroggins is a composer pursuing a Master of Music from Bowling Green State University. He received his Bachelor of Music from Arkansas State University in 2020. His compositional interests involve reflecting the coexistence of nature and technology by weaving together mundane or visceral timbres and textures. He currently studies with Elainie Lillios, and he has previously studied with Timothy Crist, Mikel Kuehn, Christopher Dietz, Derek Jenkins, and Carrie Leigh Page.

Anna Thorvaldsdottir's "seemingly boundless textural imagination" (NY Times) and "striking" (Guardian) sound world has made her "one of the most distinctive voices in contemporary music" (NPR). Her music is composed as much by sounds and nuances as by harmonies and lyrical material – it is written as an ecosystem of sounds, where materials continuously grow in and out of each other, often inspired in an important way by nature and its many qualities, in particular structural ones, like proportion and flow. Anna's music is widely performed internationally and has been commissioned by many of the world's leading orchestras, ensembles, and arts organizations – such as the Berlin Philharmonic, New York Philharmonic, City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, Gothenburg Symphony Orchestra, International Contemporary Ensemble, Ensemble Intercontemporain, and Carnegie Hall. Mateo Wojtczack is a composer and cellist from Long Island, New York. He has worked with musicians including Holly Mulcahy, the Mivos Quartet, and Nia Franklin. He has been invited to participate in festivals including Art Song Lab and SPLICE Institute.
